Opening Salvo, by John Mertl

Water Access

The Water Access Committee is stepping up its inspections of the public docks on Kahshe Lake with the view to ensuring upgrades and needed repairs are included in the Gravenhurst Town budget for 2013.

Additionally, the committee will develop a strategy for alternative docking and parking arrangements for water access

properties to be exercised in the event of the closure of one or both of the Kahshe Lake marinas.

Rock Markers

The KLRA continues to enhance the rock marker system, with three new lighthouses built or planned for this summer. With these and some small adjustments to the temporary buoys, the new rock marker system will be completed. The fulfillment of Lifetime Sponsorships continues and is planned for completion before the end of the season. IMPORTANT: Some rock markers have come off their moorings with the recent high winds. Nature Notes

Beavers Give a Dam

At the AGM, concern was expressed about the number of beavers on Kahshe. There is no hard data on the beaver population in the area, but it is normal for population numbers to increase and decrease over time. It is important to note that beavers have done far more to



increase and maintain property values on Kahshe Lake than to cause damage. Specifically, they create and maintain wetlands which pre-filter and consume nutrients in the water entering the lake. Furthermore the wetlands created by their dams buffer the water levels in Kahshe Lake.

Looking at an aerial photo or topographic map of Kahshe Lake you can see that is is surrounded by large areas of wetlands, especially upstream. With the help of the Ministry of Natural Resources, Water Management Specialist, we were able to identify a comparable lake in the area, but without the extensive up-stream wetlands.

Tasso Lake, near Lake of Bays, has a



similar surface area to drainage area ratio: 29:1 for Kahshe versus 22:1 for Tasso. Both lakes have dam structures which the MNR uses to control and maintain the lake level as close as possible to its Target Optimum Level (TOL). This TOL is not a single set point, but varies over the year according to a specific curve set for each lake. Remember the drought last summer when we went over 6 weeks without a drop of rain? There was no controlling of the water level then; there was nothing flowing over dam. At its lowest, Kahshe Lake was 19 cm. below its TOL. Meanwhile, Tasso Lake was 36 cm. below its TOL. The



upstream wetlands held a huge reservoir of water that slowly made its way to Kahshe Lake and helped maintain its later level.

During the sudden thaw and rain of this spring with all the flooding, Kahshe Lake crested at 2 cm. below its TOL. Tasso Lake was 32 cm. above its TOL. Instead of rushing directly into Kahshe Lake, the beaver dams held back most of this melt/rain water giving the North and South Kahshe rivers a chance to carry away the freshet. Comparing the difference between the highest and lowest water level recorded over the past year shows that Kahshe Lake varied by about 70 cm whereas Tasso Lake varied by 90 cm.

Without the beavers, and lots of them, to maintain the dams, the dams would eventually disappear,

the wetlands would be come creeks (dry much of the year), and Kahshe Lake's level



would fluctuate much more and faster than it does now.
Cutting down trees is part of what beavers do. If you wish to protect trees on your property.

- * Wrap individual trees in metrehigh, galvanized welded wire fencing, hardware cloth, or multiple layers of chicken wire.
- * Painting tree trunks with a sand and paint mix (120 millilitres of masonry-grade sand per litre of latex paint) has also proven somewhat effective in protecting trees from beaver damage.

It is far better to protect the tree than eliminate the beaver.

Save our turtles

Hello KLRA members! If you did not see me at your AGM, My name is Hannah and I am a turtle researcher in your area. The Georgian Bay Turtle Hospital, located at Scales Nature Park, began the Saving Turtles At Risk Today (START) project this summer. 7 of 8 of Ontario's turtles are species at risk, meaning they are on their way to extinction.



We would like to work to stop that from happening and the first step in that work is to find out where those turtles live. If you see a turtle on the

road, and it is safe to do so, please help it cross in the direction it is going. If the turtle has been hit on the road, please contact us. If it is still alive, you may be able to help it by placing the turtle in a dry box and transporting it to us (Scales Nature Park just East of Hwy 11 at Line 15). If you call us, we may also be able to arrange a pick up. Unfortunately, the Georgian Bay Turtle Hospital is not yet operational, but we are acting as a drop off for the Kawartha Turtle Trauma Centre in Peterborough and we arrange transportation of the turtle to them.

The bulk of the project involves looking for where the turtles nest and where they hibernate in order to pinpoint important habitats. We are protecting the nests we find by installing nest cages and monitoring which predators go after the nest and at what time of the year. Once we catch a Blanding's turtle (the one



with the bright yellow chin), we attach a radio transmitter to it and track its movements.

Based on the measurements (of dissolved oxygen) we have, there does not appear to be any cause for concern regarding potential water quality impacts on fish and other aquatic organisms. However, it also needs to be recognized that dissolved oxygen is not the only factor which could result in a decline in fish populations. 

The 9th Annual Kahshe Lake Regatta was well






This regatta featured a toddler sandcastle building contest, swimming, running, sack, three legged, canoe and minnow races, a hula hoop contest, a water balloon toss,

The Counter family has been coming to Kahshe for more than 100 years; Jake and his siblings spent just about every summer at the lake and Jake settled permanently in Kluey's Bay working as a house

were reminiscing about the end of summer wiener roasts several families used to put on and decided to throw their own party, with plenty of music. Naturally the party was at Jake's place. And naturally, it was a huge hit. So come!

IN MEMORIAM

Mary Isabel FURMINGER (née Wright) April 12, 1907 - January 5, 2013

Mary loved Kahshe Lake. She and her husband, Clare, bought their first lot on Grant's Bay back in the early 30's from Mary's uncle, Charley Wright, and later switched it for the lot at the mouth of Grant's Bay where they built a cottage in the early 40's. They loved to sail and we used to joke that mum would only go out in the sailboat when there was a "Mary Breeze". Many folks still remember the "Queen Mary" chugging down the bay with all 5 grandchildren aboard.

Mary and Clare had 2 daughters, Marilyn (Lyn) and Janice, and we both built cottages adjacent to our parents, thus forming a family compound. Until last summer 31 family members continued to enjoy the lake: Mary, Paul and Janice Mooney with their children, Blake and wife, Irene, and Andrea and partner, David, and their offspring; myself (Lyn) and husband, Larry Collis, and our 3 children, Doug, Gregg and Julie, each with his/her partner and children, and sometimes, grandchildren. Sadly Mary is no longer with us, nor is my husband, Larry (see below). Clare died in 1987 but Mary continued to come to the cottage until 2004. She was a weaver and a member of the Toronto Handweavers Guild, and we all have samples of her work hanging in the cottages. Mary was a very resilient lady and still had good hearing and a keen mind until the end. She will certainly be missed by all the family. Lyn Collis
