We have some plans to keep Nagaya Beach on a path to continous improvement.

The town of Gravenhurst has agreed to provide some garbage containers that are "Critter proof" for the 2013 season. Critter attacks were a major problem for us last year. The raccoons were resourceful and overturned and opened up our garbage pails on many occassions. Thank you to the many volunteers that cleaned these messes up.

The town also provided us with some new signs with Beach rules in 2012. Most people follow the rules. Some ignore them and the worst offenders are the dog owners who allow their dogs on the beach. There are obvious

reasons for not allowing dogs where our childen play and swim. Please consider their safety. The diving raft will receive a new top, so we need volunteers for this work party, which will be a Saturday morning project in mid June. Please contact Gary asap. The floating safety line will be replaced with a new one.

Wood benches will be repaired and get a fresh coat of stain. We need volunteers for this project as well. We will provide the stain and other supplies.

Nagaya beach is operated by the KLRA for the exclusive use of its members and guests. Part of the beach property (the grassed section) is land deeded to the KLRA. The balance of the land (Old

road Allowance) is leased to the KLRA (\$1 per year) from the town of Gravenhurst. Beautiful, south facing, gently sloping sand beach is a rare gift in the Muskokas. The KLRA is committed to maintaining and preserving it.

Feeding Ducks Can Be Fun, but please DON'T

(excerpt from an article in the *Oakville Beaver*) By Bernie German

Like most families, we introduced our kids to the joys of bird watching by bringing bits of bread crumbs down to the local pond to watch the ducks. Nothing like watching little kids squeal with joy as the ducks come to feed. But, while bread in extreme moderation is not harmful to ducks or birds, it

is better to avoid giving them bread at all, since moderation is hard to judge. And who knows how often others have fed the ducks we are feeding?

If you really have to feed the ducks, there are alternatives: grapes cut in half, cracked corn, barley, oats, birdseed or other grains, frozen peas that have been defrosted, or duck feed pellets available from farm supply stores. Ducks also love to eat grass seeds already growing around the pond. But it is far better not to feed them at all.

When ducks become used to being fed by humans, they no longer search for food sources on their

own. This can delay, or even prevent, their migration south. During storms and very cold winter days, (and in the winter generally in cottage country) there are fewer people out feeding the ducks and they are left hungry because humans have become their only source of food.

Just remember, a sufficient amount of food already exists within a lake or river for native waterfowl.

So, for the sake of the lake and the waterfowl . . .

please, DON'T feed the ducks.





LAKE STEWARD REPORT – April 2013


First, it's good to be through the winter, so we can all get back up and enjoy our places on the lake. As many of you know, I completed the 2012 Kahshe Lake Steward Report in late December of last year. Although it's posted on the KLRA web site, I suspect it probably hasn't jumped to the top of the best seller list, so my plan is to present smaller portions of the report in the Krier and then a summary of the entire report at the 2013 Annual Meeting. One of the



most interesting findings to date involves changes in the temperature of the lake. While most people would love to have warmer water earlier in the year so we could get in with less 'pain', we're also cognizant of the fact that this may not be good for aquatic species and may promote the growth of unwanted algal blooms. As the District Municipality of Muskoka actually measures the water temperature of Kahshe Lake at increasing

depths every two years, I've been able to plot this information to see what's happening.

The first graph compares water temperature at increasing depths for the 24 year period from 1988 to 2011. These samples were taken at the deepest location on the lake near Hens and Chickens and shows how things look in the



spring, following thermally driven turnover (mixing) in the fall and winter.

The second chart is from the same location and for the same years, but the temperatures were taken in mid-summer, as the lake starts to stratify thermally.

What does this tell

What this appears to indicate is a possible warming trend in the upper 4m of the water column during the spring

turnover sampling event.

By mid-summer, this warming trend was not apparent, as water temperatures were fairly similar over the 24 year period from the surface down to the lower, cooler water levels.

To further explore this apparent warming effect, the findings presented in two water quality lectures given by Drs. M. Palmer and S. Somers from the Ministry of the Environment at Dorset were evaluated.


In both presentations, based on statistical analysis of larger sets of Muskoka lake data and on a more intensively monitored group of nine lakes evaluated continuously by the MOE since the mid-1970s, a warming effect has been confirmed in the epilimnion (upper 5 m of the water column), and to a lesser degree in the metalimnion which is the zone below the upper 5 m and above the bottom (hypolimnion) of the lakes. It was also noted In the Palmer study that about 57% of the variance in water temperature was explained by air

temperatures. The chart below has been taken directly from the 2012 Palmer presentation.

So I guess we need to be careful what we wish for! On April 27th, I'm attending the 2013 Muskoka Stewardship Conference in Bracebridge on April 27. It is entitled: *What are You Watching?* and will feature speakers covering many of the environmental issues we're facing on Kahshe Lake. I'll have a report on the main topics in the next Krier.



Volunteers needed

And finally, a heads-up that I'm looking for about a dozen volunteers to help count little critters (worms,


mollusks, insects, crustaceans, and mites) in this year's benthic monitoring program. I don't have a date yet, but it will be in August and it will involve a morning of sitting on our deck and counting all kinds of invertebrates in sediment samples from the lake. It's a great learning experience for kids at the senior public or high school age as well as for adults who want to help keep Kahshe Lake healthy. Flip me an e-mail if you would like to participate.

Rock Marker Fund Raising Update, Randy Craig




The KLRA would like to thank all of those who contributed to the 2012 Rock Marker fund raising initiative!

Garbage pickup to continue

Despite a move by the Muskoka District Council to end garbage pick-up at road access cottages, Gravenhurst Town Council voted against the proposal and pick-up will continue as in past years from the first Monday in May, until last Friday in October. As Bob Reyburn, KLRA President, pointed out in a letter thanking Mayor Donaldson for the Town's position,"There are problems with bears and other scavengers even at the current frequency of garbage pickup. I'm appalled that anyone would make a proposal that would exacerbate the problems.

Our membership agrees with Councillor Colhoun that summer residents pay a disproportionate level of property taxes compared to urban property owners, and the only services received are roads and garbage collection."

KLRA Joins Safe Quiet Lakes

Boating safety and the impact that boats have on our lake are major concerns of many of our members as revealed in KLRA surveys over the years and by individual cottagers. The trend to larger displacement vessels, especially wake-boarding boats, with more powerful engines, the increased volume of boat traffic, and some bad boating behavior are impacting our shorelines, our wildlife, our personal safety and our enjoyment of the lake.

To help address these concerns the KLRA has joined Safe Quiet Lakes (www.safequiet.ca), a volunteer organization formed in 2011 dedicated to the development of a culture of safety on our lakes through education, through the enforcement of existing laws in partnership with the OPP and by sponsoring productive dialogues between cottagers to help improve and maintain an enjoyable and safe boating environment in Muskoka and now on Kahshe.



One of the first steps toward addressing specific Kahshe Lake issues on boating safety will be the establishment of a baseline, which will be used to illustrate the degree of success of this program in future years, and will also help us to understand and focus on the more salient issues facing us. This baseline will be based on the results of a survey to be conducted by a professional market research firm. The survey will be available electronically or via hard copy some time in late May.

We hope to have a *Safe Quiet Lakes* representative available at our *AGM* on Sunday July 7th to discuss this program in more detail, and to answer your questions
We strongly urge you all to complete this survey and to voice your concerns.

INMEMORIAM



Kenneth Rae Dunphy 1914 - 2012

We were always a family who cottaged. But for years we rented or we visited places belonging to other people, often family friends. Of course we should have had our own place --my father believed early-morning lake swims, the j-stroke and splitting wood were at the core of being Canadian and he made sure my sister and I had all those skills. Okay, maybe not splitting wood.

Then in the mid-70s, his old friend John Witbeck practically ordered him to buy one of the two lots he had for sale on Deep Bay. My father lost sleep over this but eventually bought the cheaper, scruffier one, threw up a \$3,000 prefab meant for fishermen, shoved a couple of stray bricks on top

of the concrete block foundations to steady the place and pronounced it a family cottage.

We all loved it. We were a family who believed in the smell of pine, Kahshe's early-morning sparkle and its sudden serenity at sunset, the glittery granite sheltering sharp tough sprays of blueberries in pre-Cambrian crevices, the slam of the screen door, and sunny lunches of open-face tomato and cucumber sandwiches eaten in swimsuits.

The cottage itself was never much and over the years it became even less: A too-small shoddy, airless place with duct tape gripping the door frame, rusting ill-fitting windows that welcomed in any and all biting insects, rotting eaves troughs and precarious wooden steps made dangerous with age. A dock big enough for only a single aluminum lawn chair that he would snap open with one hand and claim for himself. No screen porch, no stone fireplace – not then anyway -- not enough space to sprawl on the floor to work on a puzzle or play extended games of Monopoly. But this is where he was happy. Even when that fire at Denne's burnt our boat to a crisp. Or when beavers attacked – always his tallest, finest trees. When the old waterlogged dock he refused to replace tipped and sent him crashing against the rocks.

He was a professional engineer who travelled the world representing Canada at international standard and codesetting meetings. He was an accomplished bridge player, pianist and, yes, figure skater. (Ice dancing, not the Patrick Chan triple-salchow stuff.) He took up water skiing later in life, but was pretty good at that as well.

But what he was proudest of was the bunkie he built out back in '81. He decided it deserved a certificate of merit which he produced using calligraphy skills he acquired post retirement.

Even when I was well past (all right, decades past) voting age, he would stand on the dock to inspect my crawl stroke. He'd grab the boat keys from the yellow ceramic mug on top of the china cabinet to drive my daughter and friends whenever they wanted to waterski – even if a Jays game was on. He spent 30 summers on Kahshe, chopping wood, slashing errant junipers and swimming from the dock to the eastern rocks at 4:30 p.m. every day -- until he was 89. Even during his last few years and the onslaught of dementia, while living in a wonderful nursing home where he was treated with respect and tenderness, he would brighten – quicken -- when we spoke of Kahshe.

He died Boxing Day at Toronto General Hospital. He was 98. This summer he'll come back to Kahshe when we bury his ashes in a bend in the path beside my mother's.

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
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

First Aid Courses







We are considering three different courses, probably to be held at the <u>Ryde Community Cooperative</u>. We are also asking when would be most convenient for you.

The courses being considered are:

- 1. AED (Advanced External Defibrillator) and CPR (2 hours, \$20 per person)
- 2. Basic First Aid, including AED and CPR (8 hours, \$50 per person)
- 3. Standard First Aid / AED / CPR (16 hours, \$140 per person)
