My two years as your president have passed quickly. As I think back over this period, some things stand out for me.




I learned that an organization like the KLRA is an important advisor to our local governments, as well as an advocate for the Kahshe community.

Ron was a husband, father, grandfather, great grandfather, uncle, brother and friend. He had 5 daughters and one son, 12 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.



He went by many names, Ron, dad, grandpa, Duke, Staff, Mighty Mouse and No Pay (and a few that we cannot print). Ron was a hard-nosed police officer who never took a day off sick in his 27 years with the Toronto Police Force. He finished his police career as a Staff Sergeant and will be remembered by his police family as Mighty Mouse, badge # 4215.

Ron wore many professional hats in his lifetime; Police Officer, Assistant Chief of Fire Investigations with the Ontario Fire Marshalls Office, and eventually Municipal Councilor in Gravenhurst. If change was needed, Ron could be counted on to make it happen!

Ron was a Past Master of the Melita lodge and an active member with the Golden Rule Lodge in Gravenhurst.

He loved the outdoors, enjoyed both hunting and fishing, kept chickens, homing pigeons and bees, and really enjoyed a good drink with friends. At 78 years of age, Ron succumbed to a stroke, choosing to die peacefully on June 25th, 2011.

Cottage Safety Tips

"Fun, Family and freedom" are words we often associate with the cottage. But living without a care in the world could, in fact, prove deadly. Water is a silent killer. Drownings are the third leading cause of preventable death for children under 10 years of age. They can happen in less than a minute and in just centimetres of water.

Lifesaving Society courses can teach you and your family prevention strategies, self-rescue, rescue of others and basic first aid. (See the <u>Lifesaving Programs</u> section or contact your <u>Branch</u> for more information.) In the meantime, follow these safety tips: If you have small children, remember these tips.

- 1. Restrict access to the water.
 - Always know how your children can get to the water and establish protective barriers to prevent them from getting access to it. You might even need to crawl around at your children's height to see things that they can, but you can't.
- 2. Lock all doors when you are inside the cottage.
- 3. Secure low windows that a child might crawl through.
- 4. Build locked, childproof gates around your deck.
- 5. Establish rules that must be followed when around the water.
 - Some families require that non-swimming children wear a lifejacket or personal flotation device (PFD) whenever they are outside the cottage.
- 6. Always stay "within arms' reach."
 - It's not enough to be nearby on a dock reading a book while your child is playing on the beach. If you're not "within arms' reach" of your child, you've gone too far.
- 7. Make sure your child is wearing a lifejacket or PFD when playing near water.
- 8. Closely supervise children with inflatable toys.
 - The toys can blow away from shore and children will often follow them into deeper water. Supervise floating mats closely. Children (and adults) can get caught underneath them and go unnoticed until it's too late.
- 9. Ensure that children always wear a lifejacket or PFD when in a boat.
 - ...and set a good example for your children by wearing one yourself.
- 10. **Be prepared. Take some lifesaving and first aid training.** Know what to do if something does happen.

Lake Steward's Report by Howard Mandel

Tips for healthy water at our beautiful lake

Maintain your septic tank system to prevent harmful chemicals from entering the lake. Don't remove natural vegetation between the foundations on your property and the lake. You need a strong buffer zone to stop sediments and nutrients entering the water during and after storms.

Be respectful of the wake created by your boat. Please tube and ski in wider bodies of water, not narrow waterways.

Please be respectful of your fellow cottagers who are trying to relax on their docks.

Reminder, do not drop sand to create a beach at your property. It is illegal.

When caring for your grounds, use green, chemical-free products.

Inside and everywhere around the cottage, use alternative cleaners.

Everything makes it into the lake one way or another.

A Call to Arms

Dear Cottagers,

I am writing not only to recount a disturbing event that happened recently in front of our cottage, but to elicit a *call to action* to help prevent and address future examples of such behavior. On Sunday July 17th, my wife, Hayley, and I and a friend were enjoying some quiet conversation on our deck when we witnessed 2 jet skis run, at full speed, through a flock of 10-15 geese and goslings, and then watched in horror as one of the jet-skis turned around and ran through them a second time, leaving several of the birds wounded and all of them disoriented.

I took chase in my boat and confronted the two riders saying that this type of behaviour was not tolerated on Kahshe. Both men claimed to have no knowledge of what I was talking about.

Fortunately we were able to identify the owner of the jet-skis and called the OPP. Later, on the advice of Bob Reyburn, President of the KLRA, we also contacted the Ministry of Natural Resources. And now I am writing this Letter to the Editor.

There is bad boating behavior and then there is dangerous activity that puts us all at risk including our children. I believe that, in every survey conducted by the KLRA, boating safety has been the top concern. We need action to make real positive changes. I am recommending that the KLRA establish a public safety liaison to bridge the gap between individual cottagers and the OPP and MNR. This will provide cottagers with a voice and focus. This type of liaison position, not unique in Muskoka, is one which would focus on education, stewardship and support, and will enable us, as individual cottagers, to have more than one voice when events impact all of us.

If you are in support of the establishment of a KLRA public safety liaison, and wish to increase our ability to positively impact the experience and safety of our lake, please contact one of the KLRA board members and demand this be put into action. All the best for a safe and fun summer 2011.

The **Ryde Community Centre**'s existence is really unknown by seasonal residents although it has been here for the past 10 years. We just learned about it when we became yearround residents. For people living in or near Ryde it is a wonderful way to get to know others in the community through the various events that are held there year round. It would be wonderful if more of our summer residents would participate - we are a very friendly and inclusive bunch! I am posting events in the KLRA website now, as Clare Henderson has given us a forum there, but I know that not all KLRA members use it.

The membership fee of \$10/person/year helps us to maintain the facility as the town of Gravenhurst is withdrawing its financial support. The centre operates out of the former **Ryde Public School** at **1624 Barkway Road**. Members can book and use the centre for their own events family gatherings, even a wedding this summer. It may appeal to those who are planning family get-togethers at the

cottage but don't have enough space. Some seasonal resident members offer programs here during the summer - the current Tai Chi class is an example of that.

The RCC has 2 large rooms (former classrooms), a kitchen and washrooms. Parking is ample and there is a large playing field in the back. The Centre houses an extensive honoursystem Library with additional shelves at Summerland General Store where any community member may freely borrow books. Summerland also provides the site for the CAP computers which are sponsored by the RCC and funded by Industry Canada. The computers at Summerland are high speed and there is WiFi access as well. Both are available for a small fee of \$1 per hour.

Editorial



Safety

The Krier has often included articles about the importance of safe practises at the cottage in the areas of swimming, boating, and fire-prevention. I would like to add road safety to that list. Cottage roads, often little more than single lane trails, and the back roads leading to them offer ample opportuniy for accidents and mishaps caused by carelessness and inattention. A friend of mine, for example, drove into a ditch while trying to swat a deer-fly. Little harm done other than

to ego and pocket-book (the cost of being towed out of the ditch), but it could have been much worse.

And as many of you already know, I myself was in an accident on the morning of the Housey's Rapids Picnic. Driving north on Housey's Rapids Road at 75 kmh, straight road, perfect visibility, no other vehicle in sight, and suddenly -



BANG! My vehicle (on left) is out of control and heading for the left hand ditch, fortunately shallow and wide at this part of the road. Both airbags blow as I finally stop by slamming into a fallen tree trunk. What did I hit? A moose? A deer? A bear? No. I hit a small Mazda exiting a hidden, private driveway from my right, a car which neither stopped nor slowed down.



Both drivers walked away relatively unscathed (thanks to seatbelts and air-bags), but both vehicles have been written off. It could have been so much worse. All it takes to avoid accidents like this is common sense, consideration and constant attention to the situation on the part of ALL drivers:

Clip back trees and bushes on your driveway that obstruct a clear view of approaching traffic **Don't** exit driveways without checking carefully.

Be aware that other drivers **don't** always check carefully.

Drive more slowly on cottage and country roads. They are not highways.

Always wear your seatbelt.

Don't swat flies!

At the Craft Show last weekend, several people expressed concern at the way in which they felt threatened/vulnerable when enjoying the lake in their kayaks, canoes or pedal boats. They asked me to put in a reminder to those boaters who seem to have forgotten that power boats must always give way to and show consideration for unpowered vessels: sailboats, kayaks, canoes, rowboats, pedal boats and swimmers! These vessels always have the right of way. It would seem that having the Boat Smart card does not necessarily mean that people boat smartly!

"Power-driven vessels must keep out of the way of sailing vessels, vessels engaged in fishing, and vessels not under command, as well as rowing boats and other craft with restricted manoeuvrability. You are required to take early action to keep clear of these vessels unless being overtaken by one of them." [Quoted from Collision Regulations from Transport Canada; Marine Safety]
